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Visit to Pailin

Frances spent a week in Battambang on an English Teaching Programme

While Gabby and Theresa went back for a week's break in Singapore on 11th September, Frances set off for a week in Battambang to work with Sovin and Thida on an English programme for the Parish children ages 4-6 and 8-12.

Frances spent the first morn-

ing on information gathering and discussion regarding the elementary education system especially for the target age groups. Sovin and Thida had to work on materials from the library for the 4-6 and 8-12 respectively. In the afternoon, Frances had an opportunity to travel to Pailin, 70 km for Battambang with Fr. Totet and his catechists. The road is heavily used and in bad condition as it is the main road that the trucks use

to carry goods to and from Thailand. Their first stop is at Sneng village, a newly discovered community of three baptised Catholics. The matriarch is a 91 year old woman who is partially blind and deaf. After her return from the States after the Pol Pot regime, this woman gathered her family and rela-



tives regularly at her house to pray and spread the faith.

Once a week, Kam Thong the catechist would visit this new community for prayer and catechism lessons. One of the priests would go along if available and mass would be celebrated. On weekends, one has to get in early to get a place. During this visit, before the mass service began, Fr. Totet taught the assembly how to make the sign of the cross,

the correct gestures before the proclamation of the Word and the meaning and significance of the different parts of the mass.

It took 3 hours to get to Pailin, travelling along the muddy and bumpy dirt road. Pailin was the stronghold of Pol Pot during his regime. It was a dangerous place then as it is now with land mines all over the place. The main road is dusty with shop houses on either side. Prices of properties have escalated many folds. There are plans to build



a 4-lane highway to replace the current dirt road.

The Church is situated along the main road. It is actually a rented house. The lease was supposed to end at the end of September. The Church had been looking urgently for an alternative place. Currently there

are 25 Catholics. The youth soon gathered to select and practise the hymns for Mass. Frances was surprised to see that the males out numbered the females by three to one. an overnight stay, the group returned to Battambang. It was back to the English Programme for Frances. Sovin and Thida were very conscientious students. They did their homework well and were able to complete the first draft of the English Programme for the target age groups.



Takeo Eye Hospital

Theresa gives an account of her work as a teacher to the staff of Takeo Eye Hospital

1st October 2007 was a significant day for me. The driver from the Daughters of Charity, Chann Sophal, fetched me at 6.00 am and we proceeded to The Takeo Eye Hospital

(TEH). The car journey from Phnom Penh to TEH was one and a half hours. I had to hold on to my car seat



Mondays are usually busy days with many patients. The students were tired but in good spirit. The stu-

dents introduced themselves and expressed that learning English would help them in many ways. They could go for further training locally or overseas and to communicate with foreigners.

On 2nd October, Tuesday morning lesson was from 6.00 -7.00. Only one student came at 6.00 and the rest came at 6.20. After discussing with the students, the lesson time was adjusted to 6.15 - 7.15 am. The students and I were delighted that we would not need to get up so early.

I shared a story in print – Bath-

Time. The students could relate their own experiences of being naughty and chased by their parents which drew laughter from the class. They had a good laugh and enjoyed the

lesson. Nurse Chrek Vannak said, "I will always remember today's lesson." October is the raining season. Takeo is prone to flood and blackouts. One

morning the flooding was so bad that only two students, Meas Ratha and Mienh Davy turned up for class. Thus, we had more time for sharing. They shared their struggles, having to work from Mondays to Fridays and studying full-time on weekends too. They have hardly any time for personal life.

Blackouts are quite often, we had two lessons under the light

of the mobile phones. The students took this in their stride. For me, this is truly a new experience. On one occasion, we

had to cancel the class because of total blackout. The students looked disappointed that there was no lesson.

Some of the students were unable to attend both morning and evening lessons due to 'on-call' duties after office hours. Once, Nurse Ngeth Sarun came in his nursing gown as he did not want to be late for class. Despite, their heavy work load, studies, and family commitments they continue to attend the lessons. I felt encouraged by their enthusiasm.



Visit to Tapung and Tahen

Our MCCC members in Cambodia visited the villages of Tapung and Tahen at the end of their project in Battambang.

After the Battambang project, our members in Cambodia accepted the Tapung village students' invitation to visit their village. Fr. Gabriel SJ gave them a lift there on Sunday, 25

August. On arrival, they were greeted by a large group of children who formed the welcoming party. The two students gave a tour of their classes. They have to teach (even though they are Grade 9 students themselves) three hours a day, subjects in

Khmer and some English too to the young children of the village. On Sundays, they teach catechism.

The youth of the parish related the history of the village. The "settlers" of the village returned from the refugee camp in Thailand after the Pol Pot regime. At that time, only two families were Catholics and they had

to go to Battambang for mass. They requested for a church and the first church was a very simple building. As the village grew, the Catholic population grew as well. There are 82 baptized Catholics today. In 2003 a bigger church was built

On the way to the old church, which is now used as a classroom for the village kids, our members were invited to visit the home of a woman whose husband is half-paralysed. Her four grown-up children have all left the village. Their house was in a poor state with a leaking roof with neither windows nor a door. It distressed our

members to see the couple using their kitchen area as their sleeping quarters.

Lunch was at the home of one of the students. The main dish was snake meat (the Cambodians eat snake meat in the wet season and dog meat in the dry season) which was politely declined by our members. The hospitality was overwhelming.



Later, the trio went to Tahen for a baptism Mass which only started at 5.00 p.m. with a procession from the home of an 84 year old woman who had kept her faith during the time of the Pol Pot regime. At mass, there was a brief introduction of the international community present. The Salesian Sister in charge of the Inter-

national volunteer and the Salesian Council members were visiting Cambodia. The MCCC members were introduced and thanked for their services to the youth leaders. Their students were introduced and also shared about what they have learnt from the workshop. There

was a Youth Synod of Cambodia in Phnom Penh that week, comprising 300 youths from the three dioceses. The t-shirt with its logo was designed by the youth of Battambang. They shared briefly about the Synod and performed a dance item they presented there. Finally, the baptism ceremony took place. The mass ended

about eight, which was followed by a lovely Spanish dinner for all the guests. After dinner, five dances depicting the lives of the villages were presented by the Tahen community. After every dance, Msgr. Kike interviewed every child/dancer and gave each of them an

opportunity to practice his/her English and Spanish. Frances, Theresa and Gabby retired to their hotel room at 11.00 p.m.

San He Bridge

The final estimates of the bridge have been submitted

The San He villagers have submitted the plan of the proposed bridge. They intend to build it during winter when it is dry. The total construction cost is estimated to be RMB 83,337.00 (BND 16700) The Bridge will be 15m long, 4m wide and 3m high. Donations have been received for

the bridge from generous donors from Brunei amounting to BND 4000 so far. Anna, our member in Ziyun, Guizhou suggested that the cost of the construction of the bridge be shared by another group of potential donors. She is working on this at the moment. She proposed that



RBCS Brunei come up with another \$3000 to make a total contribution of \$7000 from the Brunei side. We welcome any generous offer to help. (cont'd from page 1)

A party for 40 adults will take place on Sunday, 23 December from 9:30am to lunch time. Gifts will be given to those attending the party. Starting a Creche

Our members in Cambodia are seriously looking into the possibility of opening a creche with the assistant of Sr. Sol for the children of the market vendors and construction workers in the Industrial Zone. It is estimated to cost around USD 400 per month to run the Centre which includes the rent, salary for the staff and food for ten toddlers aged between one and

three years. In order to fund this project it was suggested that we find a sponsor for each of the toddlers. There are ten and so it works out to be USD 40 per child (approx \$70) per month. If you can sponsor a child, please let us know so that the project can proceed as soon as possible. Further details can be found in the website.

Working from England

Fr Ivan has been steering MCCC from his residence in Maidenhead, Berkshire since last year.

Some of our readers may not have been aware of this but Fr Ivan has been directing MCCC from a distance and not from Brunei as some might have thought. Since August 2006, Fr Ivan has been living and working in the UK. He went there to take up his new appointment as the web designer for the Mill Hill Missionary Society to which he belongs. The website of the Mill Hill Missionaries was launched in February 2007 after Fr Ivan acquired some know-how on how to design websites. His knowledge on designing websites came in handy when he also set up the website for MCCC. Since June 2007, Fr Ivan has taken up a new appointment as the Secretary General of the Mill Hill Society. As Secretary, not only has he to do some clerical and office duties, he also has to keep up to date the details of all the Mill Hill members scattered throughout the world. Fr Ivan also works part-time occasionally as an APF-Mill Hill appealer. This means that he has to spent weekends at various parishes in the Archdiocese

of Westminster, London and preach at all masses with the purpose of promoting mission and getting parishioners to take home a red box to put in their contributions for the mission countries and the training of Mill Hill missionaries. He has signed up to do ten appeals next year. Lately, he has been involved in the local parish of St. Joseph in Maidenhead, not only singing in the choir occasionally but also conducting a workshop for the training and formation of Extraoordinary Ministers of Holy Communion for the local Pastoral Area consisting of three parishes in the Diocese of Portsmouth. In his spare time, Fr Ivan struggles to update the various websites he has undertaken upon himself, unfortunately hampered by his limited knowledge and skills of the web. To add to that, his major headache is the difficulty of getting good stories and materials for the websites but he is quite optimistic that given time, he will have things under his belt before he completes his appointment, hopefully, in three years' time.
